NUFC/SUFC – Building Bridges	'Building Bridges' is more than a football project. Newcastle United Foundation and Foundation of Light will use the power of football to engage young people, helping to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour between young fans. Throughout the project they will be discussing youth crime, disorder and ASB focusing on football related rivalries between the two teams.  The first 'Building Bridges' project was delivered over a four month period (from 4 November 2013 to 31 March 2014) and engaged 1,216 young people aged 9-18 years in our region. Custom Reels Project	Custom Reels is the new initiative from The Customs House, a mixed arts venue on the banks of the River Tyne in South Shields.  Custom Reels aims to provide cinema and filmmaking Opportunities to 13-19 year olds living in South Tyneside and surrounding areas.  The grant from The Commissioners Community Fund will allow Custom Reels to continue our free screenings for young people every Tuesday evening and to allow our young filmmakers group to invest in professional equipment to raise creative confidence.  Our Custom Reels Filmmakers is formed of around 20 young people who meet every Thursday evening. NSPCC	Funding will help provide a therapeutic service for children and young people who have been victims of sexual abuse. It was introduced in 2011, following NSPCC's research and other evidence that revealed lack of therapeutic services for children and young people who have been sexually abused and inconsistency in the quality of the services that do. An intervention manual has been developed as part of this service which combines the best of existing therapeutic methods. 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	on the therapeutic relationship between the child and practitioner and includes the safe carer as an integral part of the intervention. Throughout the course of the service, we are developing a body of robust knowledge and learning, rigorously tried and tested through our evaluation that has the capacity to influence services for child victims of sexual abuse across the sector in the long run. The funds from Northumbria PCC will be allocated towards the cost of practitioners at our service centre in Newcastle. The practitioners are at the front-line of service delivery and work directly with children and families.		
Newcastle Street Pastors	Funding to enhance work on the streets of Newcastle, and North Tyneside as part of the coordinated inter agency efforts in the night time economy. Funding will contribute to items such as space blankets, first aid items, disposable latex free gloves, bottled water which are taken out on every shift. Funding the purchase of these essential supplies would potentially enable us to increase our coverage in Newcastle. The usual model for a Street Pastor initiative is two patrols per week, but working closely in the community with the police we have been able to quickly introduce a new patrols in areas that need our presence In summer Saturday afternoon patrols in Whitley Bay/Cullercoats using the Metro and getting to know the young ones that hang around Cullercoats Metro, and Friday night Beach patrols. Acorns	Funding for a Court Independent Domestic Violence Adviser who continues to forge links within the Criminal Justice system promoting a joined up approach in order to ensure the victim has a positive experience within the Criminal Justice system.  The IDVA makes contact victims many of whom had not been referred through any other referral system or current protocol agreements. Once the victim has been contacted and accepted support a Risk Assessment is carried out in order to assess the current level of risk to the victim. An individualised safety plan is then developed, in line with CAADA (Coordinated Action Against Abuse) recommendations and guidelines.
