## A Safe haven in the Bigg Market

To ensure people can enjoy their nights out safely, Street Pastors are working alongside the Police & Crime Commissioner, Police Officers, the North East Ambulance service & Newcastle City Council. The Safe Haven Van is parked in the Bigg Market on Friday and Saturday evenings between 10pm and 4am offering support to anyone in need. Staff from St John's Ambulance (vehicle next to safe Haven) are also available with Police Officers inside the Safe Haven van to talk to people, pass on safety information and give medical assistance.

Street Pastors use the Safe Haven when they are called to assist a vulnerable person, especially when the temperatures drop. The Safe Haven provides a place to warm up and recharge mobile phones. The Street Pastors may leave the person in the Safe Haven knowing they are being looked after and return later to assist the person to get home via a taxi or see them safely to their hotel.

## New Street Pastors begin training

What do Elisabeth, Andrea, Kath, Dave, John, Alison, Solomon Ruth & Allison have in common?

Answer: They wish to become Street Pastors.

We have been blessed to have 9 new volunteers. Over the next six months they will receive over 40 hours of training, beginning with Roles & Responsibilities, a realistic introduction to the Street Pastor ministry, in March. They will then continue with First Aid, vulnerable adults, Good News, mental health, listening skills, youth culture, drugs & alcohol, probation and safeguarding

# An Interview with John: on being a Street Pastor

When did you become a Street Pastor?

Since 2015 I have been honored and privileged to be part of Newcastle Street Pastors.

What attracted you to Street Pastors?

The normal Street Pastor shift from around 10.30pm to around 4am in the morning can leave you feeling a bit drained, due to the many situations the team has had to deal with but I often come away feeling both a bit tired and exhilarated knowing that a positive difference has been made. Then I need a snack and a cuppa before bed!
