During the election campaign I spoke to many people from the top to the bottom of the region and I gave five clear commitments that I would work on:

- Focusing on cyber-crime.
- Taking a zero tolerance stance against hate crime.

I'll be working with the Chief Constable to deliver these priorities.

DIARY UPDATE

As Police and Crime Commissioner, my priority is to tackle the issues that matter to you. Here is just a flavour of how I have done this in my first week -

 Discussed with the Chief Constable how deprivation and health inequality has risen just as crime figures have increased. Northumbria will work with others to ensure we provide people with vital services that will improve their health, their lives and drive them away from crime.

 I met with police commissioners from across the country to go over how we can tackle serious crime. Criminals often work with other gangs across force boundaries to make money from misery. Northumbria is fully prepared to work with others to break

down these networks.

 Responded to emails and letters regarding queries that relate to Northumbria Police

 Called upon the Prime Minister to 'Get Serious'.

 Attended and spoke at another brilliant Pride in Newcastle.

Reviewed all the applications for the Commissioner's Community Fund - so much great work going on across the region, I look forward to meeting many of these groups in the weeks and months ahead.

MEETING 'TEAMNORTHUMBRIA'

During the summer I am going to be out and about meeting our fantastic police officers and staff who deliver frontline services, those who work behind the scenes and the brilliant support staff and volunteers.

You may have watched the recent BBC1 series 'Our Cops in the North' which shows the real breadth of issues that our police officers and staff deal with. Northumbria Police work closely with many partners and other blue light services to make a difference and I thank each and every one of them for their commitment to being there when needed most.

However, cuts to vital services that people rely on such as mental health and youth provision are adding to the remit of a police officer's or PCSO's role. This series is reinforcing the need for properly funded public services and it's good that local residents can see the dedication of our officers and staff when dealing with many difficult situations.

RURAL CRIME

Northumbria Police force is unique in that it covers rural, urban and coastal areas. Ensuring effective policing in all our communities is important to me, a recent

report by the National Farmers Union revealed the cost of crime to rural communities. One rural crime is one too many, whether it be the theft of a tractor or stealing livestock, if it's

happening we must do all we can to stop it. I want our police officers to continue working with our partners to ensure we do all we can to support those who live or work in our rural communities. Crimes impacting on our rural areas will not be tolerated here in Northumbria and we will do all we can to make sure victims feel heard and supported.
